County of Jackson and State of Ohio aforesaid May
term 1824 and the 27th day of May aforesaid
personally appeared in open Court this Court
being a Court of record in and for the County
aforesaid John Counter aged about seventy years
and resident in the said County of Jackson
who being first duly sworn according to law
doth on his oath declare that he was in the
year 1779 & 1780 a citizen of Virginia and was
in 1779 or 1780 he does not now recollect distinctly
which and during the Revolutionary War drafted
as a soldier for eighteen months service in said War
and served out a part of said time in the Company
of Captain Bedinger or Budinger in the Regiment com-
manded by Col Danks or Dark under General Daniel
Morgan that before the said time of service enlisting
in Winchester Virginia he the said John Counter
enlisted into the service of the Government as a
soldier during the war in the Company of
Captain Finly or Findley that he was enlisted
by Col Holme in May 1781 as near as he can
now recollect and was put into the Company
of the said Finly in a Regiment commanded
by one Colonel Dark or Danks under the com-
mand of in the Brigade of General Morgan that
he served as a soldier from the time of his said
enlistment during the said War and was
honorable discharged at the end of the
war

was in 1782 or 1783 that he received a certificate
of discharge which he has lost & is not now able
to produce, and that he has no other proof of his
service than his statement aforesaid and the affi-
davit of Thomas Cauter a brother hereunto annexed
the number of the Regiment and the
Christian name of the Officer otherwise known as
above stated he does not now recollect that at the
time of his said certificate and ever since he has
been a Citizen of the United States and that he the
said John Cauter at no time before or since the
first day of March 1818 by gift sale or in any
manner has disposed of his property or any
part thereof with a view or intent thereby to
diminish it so as to bring himself within the
provisions of an act of Congress entitled an
act to provide for certain persons engaged in
the land and Naval service of the United States
in the revolutionary War passed on the 18th day
of March 1818 and that he has not nor has any
person in trust for him any property securities
contracts or debts due to him nor hath he any
income other than what is mentioned in the
Schedule here below and by him subscribed
to wit one horse of the value of fifteen dollars
and one Cow of the value of seven dollars

declare that by occupation he is a farmer and of
an age incapable of doing much labour has a
wife aged about sixty and quite infirm living with
him and a Daughter Mary fifteen years old
a son William 27 years old who is a lunatic
both living with him and wholly dependent on him
for a support and four other sons John 39 years
old, Henry 26 years old, James 30 years old married
and Daniel 23 years old unmarried all living
abroad and not in circumstances to render him
any assistance and that he is actually in needy
circumstances and has no expectations of
relief from any other quarter than the government

Dear Madam:

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 42642, based upon the Revolutionary War service of John Canter.

While residing in the state of Virginia, he enlisted in 1780 and served as a private in Captain Bedinger's and Captain Finley's company in Colonel Darke's Virginia regiment, and served until the close of the war.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 27, 1824, at which time he was living in Jackson County, Ohio, and was seventy years of age.

In 1824 his wife was about sixty years of age, her name not given; his daughter, Mary aged fifteen years, and his son, Hiram aged twenty-seven years, lived at home then. He referred also, at this time to four other sons: John aged thirty-nine years, Henry aged twenty-six years, James aged thirty years, married, and Daniel aged twenty-three years, unmarried.

In 1826 and in 1843 the soldier, John Canter was living in Scioto County, Ohio.

The soldier's brother, Thomas Canter, in 1826, was living in Jackson County, Ohio, and his brother, Truman Canter, then resided in Rockcastle County, Kentucky.

In order to obtain the date of last payment of pension, name of person paid and possibly the date of death of the above named Revolutionary War pensioner,

you should apply to The Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D.C., citing all of the following data: John Gantex, certificate #18858, issued August 24, 1836, rate \$2.00 per month, commenced August 10, 1836, Act of March 18, 1818, Ohio Agency.
